La Misión Dental Clients Come from Near and Far

r. Minh Vu, staff dentist at La Misión Family Health Care, is seeing patients from as far north as Evans Road in San Antonio, and as far south as Victoria, Texas. Why



are they coming from so far away? "My patients tell me that there are no dental services available to the uninsured near their homes. They hear about me through word of mouth—*literally*," Dr. Vu (*left*) says with a big smile.

Her patients leave

with big smiles, too, although she admits, "I am mostly doing emergency treatment like extractions for pain relief right now. I would like to be able to offer them more comprehensive dental care starting with a complete exam to identify all of their dental needs."

Dr. Vu has been treating a group of Pakistani immigrants from a Muslim community on the far north side of San Antonio. Dr. Vu says, "These individuals are excellent patients. They are eager to comply with the dental plan and they are very appreciative of the services."

One of the local community members, Zainoor Hashim, arranged health screenings for the immigrant group, which numbers about 1,000. Most of them do not speak English, so she drives and translates for them. This led to meeting Dr. Vu and to groups of Pakistani patients making the trek in small groups to La Misión, 40 miles from the neighborhood where they live.

Transportation and financial limitations that affect both groups of dental patients would be

helped, Dr. Vu said if she had access to a mobile digital x-ray unit so she could reach more individuals offsite by taking her services "on the road."

Dr. Vu is an Air Force veteran and has worked at La Misión since 2011. She received her DDS from UT Health Science Center in 1998. In addition to her proficiency in general dentistry, she is skilled in endodontics, oral surgery, and restorative dentistry.

Message from the President/CEO

ven though organizations like ours love to quote numbers of people served and such, behind every number is a face, a family, a struggle, and if all goes well, a solution to a problem.

A child came to one of our two early childhood education centers earlier this year after being kicked out of two child care programs due to disruptive behaviors that his teachers could not tolerate or



cope with. His mom and dad brought him to DePaul Children's Center, worried and apprehensive that this would be yet another negative learning experience for their child and for themselves.

The Child & Family Specialist (CFS) consulted with Mom soon after the boy's enrollment to support her and address her concerns regarding her child's current needs, as well as their previous experiences with the other early childhood centers. Our classroom teachers receive ongoing training in expert classroom management skills. This troubled little boy was accepted "as is," and the teachers immediately met him where he needed to be met at his current social and emotional level of development. Apart from normal frustrations every now and then that are part of the learning process, his days are filled with nurturing support, stimulating classroom experiences, and encouragement from his teachers and the CFS, who continues to work directly with him. He is growing socially and emotionally, as every child should have the opportunity to do.

This kind of success story happens often in the Daughters of Charity early childhood development program. The Child & Family Specialist, the Family Care Coordinator, and the specialized training we offer our teachers are funded by a combination of Methodist Healthcare Ministries and the Daughters of Charity Province of St. Louise Mission in Ministry program. This funding makes it possible for us to offer enhanced family and individual support services, beyond what is found in many, if not most, child care programs in the city. Our program is exceptional and we are committed to preparing our children for success in school and in life.





Ruben Escobedo Honored as Servant Leader at Annual Event

or the fifth time, Daughters of Charity Services of San Antonio has presented the St. Vincent DePaul Servant Leadership Award. This year the award went to Ruben Escobedo at a luncheon on June 18. As the epitome of a Servant Leader, Ruben Escobedo embodies St. Vincent de Paul's directive that "Servant Leaders provide an encouraging atmosphere in which the talents, capacities, and spiritual charism of the members are identified, developed and put to the service of the community," With more than 50 years of experience as a CPA and business executive, and a history of community and corporate directorships, Ruben has earned admiration and respect throughout all levels of the community.
